CITY COMMISSION MEETING

City Adopts the PRCA Marina Master Plan

After a comprehensive and masterful presentation, the Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to adopt the City of Hollywood Parks, Recreation and Cultural Arts Marina Master Plan. This Plan, with the approval of Resolution [R-2022-097](#), will guide the City in positioning the Marina to be a top-rated modern facility that will accommodate the current and future needs of the boating industry.



In December 2020, the City Commission approved and authorized staff to execute an agreement with Moffat & Nichol, the global infrastructure consulting firm that conducted data collection and technical studies, hosted various public engagement activities to gather feedback and listen to the community, and developed concepts that compared redoing the Marina with its existing footprint (Concept A) versus an expanded one (Concept B).

Jackie Brower of Moffat & Nichol presented an overview of the work that has been done to date. Feedback received from stakeholders identified a list of core project concepts that would ensure the success of the marina: Optimization and modernization of the marina and upland; resiliency; safety; security; traffic; parking; parkways and green space; and functional uses, operations, costs and revenue potential.

During the public feedback sessions, Moffat & Nichol presented the two concepts - Concept A which essentially was a modernization of the current marina, and Concept B which included an expanded footprint with a new marina building with three stories and other design concepts. The feedback and the technical studies that were conducted helped to identify opportunities that could better align the City's marina with the market.

Moffat & Nichol proposed a hybrid concept that would incorporate portions of both and increase revenue by 105-189% or \$1.3-2.3 million per year. The hybrid concept optimizes the space and would include 77 boat slips, fuel dock accessibility and the expansion of docks that to allow for larger vessels, an improved sea wall, and more.

City Executes Work Order for Phase 2 of Citywide Stormwater Master Plan

The Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Resolution [R-2022-100](#) authorize city officials to execute the work order with CDM Smith for Phase 2 of the Stormwater Master Plan.

Phase One of the Stormwater Master Plan is complete, and John Goldman of CDM Smith provided a brief overview of the activities that took place in the first year. So far, comprehensive program goals, constraints, and opportunities have been established; an updated stormwater asset database has been created and community workshops have been held; and modeling of the existing conditions and finding the root causes of the current flooding have been determined. In year two, the team will evaluate alternatives for flood mitigation and climate change effects, develop a prioritized capital improvement plan for the City's desired level of service and funding, provide guidance with future policies, and update stormwater design standards. City Enters Agreement with FEC Railway to Perform Landscape Maintenance

The Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Resolution [R-2022-096](#) to enter into an agreement with Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway, LLC that would allow the City to perform landscape maintenance along the FEC corridor. Currently, the City is prohibited from performing any maintenance activity within 25' of the centerline of the closest rail, which is considered Railway right-of-way. This approval allows the City to enhance the level of maintenance from Pembroke Road to Sheridan Street between Dixie Highway and 21st Avenue.

Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Broward County PBA Approved

The Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Resolution [R-2022-098](#) to execute the 2021-2022 Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Broward County Police Benevolent Association. The agreement, which is in effect through September 30, 2022, provides for a 2 percent base increase and a one-time premium payment of \$1,000, an increase in the reimbursement amount from the Health and Wellness Plan, an increase in the number of free Employee Assistance Program sessions, and more. Surtax Projects Approved

The Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Resolutions [R-2022-082](#), [R-2022-083](#) and [R-2022-084](#) to authorize city officials to execute agreements for professional construction engineering and inspection services for three surtax projects: (1) the resurfacing of N. 58th Avenue, between Johnson Street and Sheridan Street by AE Engineering, Inc.; (2) rehabilitation and maintenance activities of North Park Road (Sheridan Street to Oak Drive), North 26th Avenue (Taft Street to Sheridan Street), West Park Road (North

Park Road to North 40th Avenue), Raleigh Street (North Park Road to North 38th Avenue), and Sarazen Drive (North 35th Street to North 46th Avenue by Tectonic Group International; and (3) rehabilitation and maintenance of Liberty Street by CES Consultants, Inc. 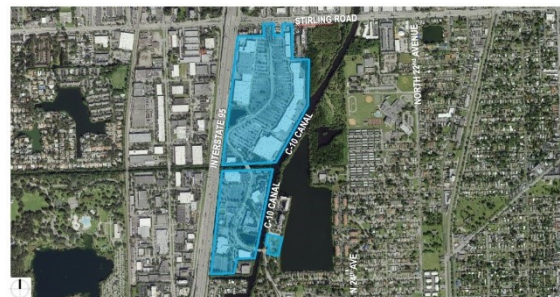
ORDINANCES

Ordinance Amendment for Beach Restrictions Approved

After two previous First Readings, staff incorporated the suggested revisions to Chapter 99 of the Code of Ordinances that were made by the City Commission. The amendments would allow open air canopies, canopies designed for babies and small children, and lounge chairs with attached cabanas on the beach. The Commission agreed to remove the distance separation between umbrellas, and the distance between canopies was extended to 20 feet, and 10 feet from a dune. In addition, the Commission disregard the establishment of beach closing hours. After some discussion, the Mayor and City Commission voted to approve (6-1, Comm. Biederman dissent) Ordinance [PO-2022-04](#). The approved amendments include a prohibition on tents, bicycles greater than 48 inches wide, low-profile recumbent cycles with a wheel diameter of less than 24 inches and an exemption for devices used for the mobility of disabled individuals. Ordinance Amendment Approved to Change Land Use Designation for Oakwood

On second reading, the Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously (6-0, VM Shuham recused) to approve Ordinance [PO-2021-09](#) to amend the City's Comprehensive Plan by changing the land use designation for property located at 2609 N. 26th Avenue and the adjacent parcels to the north and west, which are situated south of Stirling Road and east of Interstate 95. The amendment changes the land use designation from General Business and Open Space and Recreation to Activity Center (Oakwood Activity Center).



Since First Reading, the applicant has received all required approvals from the County and State and voluntarily committed to restrict 10% of the proposed dwelling units (at least 380 units) as affordable housing units at the moderate-income level for a minimum of 30 years.

First Reading: Amendment to Value Threshold for Minimum Landscape Requirements

On first reading, the Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve an amendment to Article 9 of the Code of Ordinances for minimum landscape requirements for single family residences. The current code states that for all new construction, any work that results in a 50 percent increase in floor area, or renovations that exceed \$60,000 must comply with the landscape requirements. Ordinance [PO-2022-06](#)

would remove the minimum threshold dollar amount of \$60,000 for any construction or renovations to single family residences to meet landscaping requirements, which has created difficult and undue burdens and poses penalties on simple home maintenance, rehabilitation and upgrade projects that have little or no relevancy to landscape improvements. First Reading: Ordinance Amendment to Update Requirement for Tree Removal

The Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Ordinance [PO-2022-07](#) to amend Chapter 106 of the Code of Ordinances to update the requirements for the removal of trees. The proposed changes would include redefining the measurements of a tree from a two-inch or more trunk diameter and 4.5 feet above grade to a trunk diameter of three inches or more and measures 4.5 feet above grade. The proposed amendment also removes the requirement of notifying the City when a property owner plans to remove a tree. First Reading: Ordinance Amendment to Update Requirements for Driveways and Aprons

The Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Ordinance [PO-2022-08](#) to amend Chapter 155 of the Code of Ordinances to update the requirements for driveways and aprons. The current Ordinance only allows concrete, asphalt or sand oiled surfaces for the driveways. The proposed language allows for many other hard dustless materials to be used such as:

- Pervious or impervious concrete
- Pervious or impervious asphalt
- Pervious or impervious Interlocking Paver Systems
- Two Strip Driveways
- Concrete, asphalt or paver sections with sod, artificial sod or stone in between the concrete slabs
- Natural Stone Pavers
- Turf Block (West of US1)

First Reading: Ordinance Amendment to Address Retrieval of Shopping Carts

On first reading, the Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Ordinance [PO-2022-09](#) to create new sections Of Chapter 129 of the Code of Ordinances to address the retrieval of shopping carts by commercial businesses. Currently, the City's Public Works Department retrieves as many as 200 shopping carts every month and returns them to retailers. This is not only a burden on City resources but also private businesses, as carts sustain additional wear and tear, and unreturned carts are regularly replaced. The proposed sections, entitled "retrieval Plan" and "Plan Submission and Review," would ensure the burden of responsibility would be shifted to the retailers who choose to accommodate their patrons with the use of shopping carts. GRANTS

FY23 Work Zone Safety Grant

On Consent Agenda, the Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Resolution [R-2022-089](#) for the Hollywood Police Department's submission of the FY23 Work Zone Safety Grant application. If awarded, this \$50,000 grant will provide funding for new, state-of-the-art speed measurement and message trailer equipment that will allow officers to issue warnings and conduct enforcement more efficiently, effectively, and safely.

FY23 Speed and Aggressive Driving Enforcement Grant

The Mayor and City Commission voted unanimously to approve Resolution [R-2022-090](#) to ratify the Hollywood Police Department's grant application for the FY23 Speed and Aggressive Driving Enforcement Grant. If awarded, this grant will help fund the purchase of speed measurement and radar equipment that will allow officers to issue warnings and citations more efficiently, effectively, and safely.

Broward County's Land Use Plan for Affordable Housing and Transit-Oriented Development

Broward County Commissioner Steve Geller presented the County's land use plan for affordable housing and transit-oriented development. The goals of this program are to increase affordable housing supply and the overall housing stock and target strategic locations that would develop the transit-oriented corridors that would reduce the number of cars on the road, increase mass transit use and create walkable

communities. According to Commissioner Geller, municipalities that adopt this land use plan as a permitted use will earn bonus points for expired CRA funded projects and for prospective surtax projects where substantial transportation-related benefits would be realized.
